Half-Time Studies

- If you are unable to study full-time, you can apply to complete your studies on a half-time basis. To qualify, you must have received an offer of admission to the full-time program.
- You will be required to demonstrate special circumstances that could be accommodated by studying on a half-time basis. These circumstances might include primary responsibility for the care of young children or other dependents; personal or family health difficulties; accommodations required to promote education equity (for example, considerations affecting persons who have a physical or learning disability); or financial hardship.
- Once you have received an offer of admission to the full-time program, you may write to the Chair of the Admissions Committee to request half-time status. Persons studying on a half-time basis must complete their program within 6 years of Admission.

General Certificate in Law

- This program offers a basic legal education to students not intending to practice law. As a result, the teaching objectives for this program are focused on the study of law as a social phenomenon and on understanding the

impact of law on various aspects of society. The certificate program is offered on a part-time basis only. However, you can register in additional courses in other disciplines on a full-time basis if you have all the course prerequisites. This general certificate in law comprises 30 credits (10 courses). You can take this program in English, in French or in both languages.

- Admission requirements:

- In order to apply to the law general certificate program, you must:
 - Have at least a secondary school; or
 - CEGEP or College diploma (CAAT); or
 - a minimum of 30 prior university credits before applying to this program; or
 - hold a high school diploma. Exceptionally candidates with a high school diploma and justifying work experience may be considered.
 - Minimum average required in order to be considered: 70%
- Applicants should submit a cover letter and curriculum vitae; or
 - have the knowledge required to enter the

6) Letters of recommendation are not required and, if submitted, will not form part of the applicant's file.

Applicants who completed their undergraduate degrees (or completed more than a year of study) at postsecondary institutions outside of Canada or the United States may be required to submit a third-party assessment of their transcripts (from World Evaluation Services, or equivalent) as a condition of an offer of admission.

Half-time

The program is not intended for those who want to test their interest in law, who prefer a light course load, or wish to pursue other interests while studying law.

Eligibility:

- Consideration is given to:
 - 1) J.D. applicants in the Regular, Mature and Aboriginal categories who have applied to, and have been offered admission to, full-time degree studies.
 - 2) Applicants must demonstrate that they are not able to attend on a full-time basis because of any of the following:
 - Health or physical disability.
 - Exceptional family obligations either to young

children or dependents requiring their presence at home.

- **Financial hardship:** as financial hardship is common to many students, applicants seeking admission under this criterion must establish unique and compelling reasons.

In limited circumstances, consideration may also be given to occupational involvement where an applicant is established in a continuing office or performing duties of a public character or benefit and whose work would be assisted and improved by the study of law.

Mature Applicants

Mature applicants are those who have or will have at least 5 complete years of non-academic experience. The years of non-academic experience need not be consecutive, but must have been undertaken independently of academic work. Such experience may consist of both remunerated work and unpaid labour, including the care and raising of children. In addition to an applicant's academic record, the Committee will consider an applicant's ability to organize his or her life and work, ability to reason, analyze and engage in intellectual inquiry, and past experience. The Committee may place less emphasis on the applicant's academic record where there has been a significant lapse of time since its completion or where adverse personal or socio-economic circumstances, including linguistic and cultural

barriers, have affected its development.

For those mature applicants with fewer than 2 years of undergraduate university study, the Admissions Committee may give greater weight to other evidence of ability to study law successfully, such as experience or success in another field of endeavour. However, in view of the large number of qualified applicants who have at some time demonstrated their academic ability in a university program, those applicants with no university will find it virtually impossible to gain admission. Over the last decade no applicants have been admitted without some university background.

There is no target or quota on the number of mature candidates admitted, but there has been a steady increase in both the number and the competitiveness of mature applicants. In recent years, approximately 300 applications have been received annually. As a result the Mature category has been virtually as competitive as the General category.

The following documents are required of general, mature and Aboriginal applicants, and constitute a complete file. These materials must be submitted directly to OLSAS:

- 1) Ontario Law School Application Service (OLSAS) application;
- 2) Official and original copies of all post-secondary academic transcripts;
- 3) All Law School Admission Test (LSAT) scores; and
- 4) A personal statement (required) and additional essay

- 5) Mature applicants only: a resume in addition to materials in 1-4.
 - 6) Letters of recommendation are not required and, if submitted, will not form part of the applicant's file.

Aboriginal Applicants

Our Aboriginal application category is designed to identify exceptional students who will bring a broad and complex set of life experiences to the study of law. We strive to build a diverse and unique community of students who will forge lifelong friendships as they learn with and from each other. Aboriginal applicants are requested to outline in their personal statements their interest in, identification with, and connection to their communities.

The following documents are required of general, mature and Aboriginal applicants, and constitute a complete file. These materials must be submitted directly to OLSAS:

- 1) Ontario Law School Application Service (OLSAS) application;
 - 2) Official and original copies of all post-secondary academic transcripts;
 - 3) All Law School Admission Test (LSAT) scores; and
 - 4) A personal statement (required) and additional essay (optional).
- 5) Mature applicants only: a resume in addition to materials in 1-4.
- 6) Letters of recommendation are not required and, if

submitted, will not form part of the applicant's file.

The Faculty of Law strongly supports the Program of Legal Studies for Native People (PLSNP) at the University of Saskatchewan's Native Law Centre. In appropriate cases, admission may be conditional on successful performance in the PLSNP. Aboriginal applicants who are given a non-conditional offer of admission are also eligible and encouraged to attend the PLSNP.

The PLSNP's Property law course satisfies the Faculty of Law's first year Property law requirement; students who have successfully completed the PLSNP will not take Property Law in their first year at the Faculty.

Funding for the PLSNP is available through the Legal Studies for Aboriginal People Pre-Law Bursary administered by Indspire. If students are unsuccessful in their application or ineligible for this bursary, the Faculty of Law may reimburse admitted Aboriginal students who complete the PLSNP accordingly: up to \$2,700.00 for PLSNP tuition, and up to \$1,000.00 in reasonable housing, food and travel costs (original receipts required). Note that the actual amount students will be reimbursed will depend on the available funds for that year and student financial need.

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PBSC FAMILY LAW PROJECT (FLP) 2013-2014 FULL-TIME SUMMER AND PART-TIME SCHOOL-YEAR POSITIONS

WHAT IS PBSC?

Pro Bono Students Canada (PBSC) is a national student organization with a chapter in every law school in the country. Our mandate is to provide early, practical learning experiences for law students and high-quality volunteer legal services for our community partners, while promoting the value of *pro bono* lawyering among the next generation of law students. The University of Toronto Faculty of Law houses and supports the PBSC National Office. The role of the National Office is to provide a vision and direction for the national program, train local Program Coordinators at the start of each program year, and to support, guide and monitor the work of our 21 chapters.

WHAT IS THE FLP?

PBSC'S Family Law Project (FLP) is an award-winning initiative that provides legal assistance to low-income clients in a high priority area of law. Utilizing law students to support and enhance the work of LAO staff, duty counsel and advice lawyers, the program provides unrepresented litigants with legal assistance at courthouses in the GTA, and provides law students with the opportunity develop critical legal skills while learning about the court process, the practice of family law and legal aid lawyering. The FLP launched in Ontario in 1998, and in 2001 began receiving funding from Legal Aid Ontario (LAO). During this time, PBSC student volunteers have assisted LAO lawyers in serving over 12,000 unrepresented litigants across the province.

THERE ARE SIX FLP JOB OPPORTUNITIES IN TORONTO (BETWEEN OSGOODE AND U OF T)

PBSC Family Law Project Coordinator (2 positions):

Students work full-time (35 hours/week) May-August at the three Family Law courts in the GTA (North York, Brampton and 311 Jarvis). Coordinators work with court staff under the direct supervision of LAO duty counsel and advice lawyers, to assist unrepresented clients drafting court documents and providing legal information. The Coordinators document statistics and client feedback and contribute to the expansion and development of the FLP program within the GTA, alongside the PBSC Manager and the Ontario FLP Coordinator. In September, October and November Coordinators work between 8-10 hours/week and in second term they work 5 hours/week training and leading a team of law student volunteers. This position provides excellent experience in legal drafting, advocacy and client interviewing skills, along with unparalleled exposure to family litigation and civil procedure. Coordinators must attend the PBSC Training Conference in May (and will be paid for their time).

PBSC Ontario Family Law Project Coordinator (1 position):

The Ontario FLP Coordinator will work full-time (35 hours/week) from May-August. The Coordinator works 10 hours/week in September and October, and between 5-8 hours/week in November. Approximately 60% of the student's time will be devoted to working three days/week on *ex parte* and short notice motions and other files as needed at the North York Court. The remaining 40% will be spent working with the PBSC National Office on general coordination of the FLP summer program. The Coordinator will assist with data collection, liaise with students, court staff and Judges to provide support or assist with troubleshooting where necessary, coordinate Judge's Luncheons, monthly meetings, and plan the Fall training programs for the FLP School Year Program. In addition to providing students with specialized experience in legal drafting and client advocacy, this position also

provides students with invaluable program management skills. Coordinators must attend the PBSC Training Conference in May (and will be paid for their time).

PBSC Family Law Project Summer Students (3 positions):

Students work full-time (35 hours/week) May-August, and part-time September and October, at the three Family Law courts in the GTA (North York, Brampton and 311 Jarvis). Guided by the FLP Coordinators and under the direct supervision of LAO duty counsel and advice lawyers, students assist unrepresented clients draft court documents and provide legal information. This position provides excellent experience in legal drafting, advocacy and client interviewing, along with unparalleled exposure to family litigation and civil procedure.

HOW DO I APPLY?

At the University of Toronto, hiring for the Family Law Summer Student positions is done during the Faculty OCI process. You will be required to provide:

1. An up-to-date résumé;
2. A cover letter describing your interest in the program; and
3. Three references.
